During the IPA World Congress in Ohrid I had the pleasure to introduce to you the United Nations Secretary General's Campaign UNITE to End Violence Against Women. The Campaign proclaimed the 25 November 2024 (the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women) as their main action day. The International Relations Commission (IRC) initiated with Desislava Viktorova, my project leader, to analyse the UNs suggestion to take action on the orange day, launched in 2014 with the aim of ending violence against women. This project recognises the pervasive nature of gender-based violence and the critical role that law enforcement plays in preventing and responding to it. By providing training, resources, and support to police officers around the world, the Unite Project empowers them to become more effective in addressing domestic violence, sexual assault, and other forms of violence against women.

The Unite Project is more than just a campaign; it is a commitment to creating a safer and more equitable world for all women. By promoting gender equality within law enforcement agencies, IPA is helping to break down stereotypes and biases that can hinder effective responses to violence against women. GIMBORN TALKS

GIMBORN TALKS – WHAT ARE THEY AND ARE THEY REALLY NEEDED?

In 2015 Germany and the Netherlands decided to gather the German speaking countries at Gimborn Castle, hence the original name Gimborn Gespräche. The idea was to establish a forum for informal evaluation of the World Congress. The forum has developed over the years and has become English speaking. Albeit, informality and simplicity are still the hallmarks of the forum. Today meetings are held twice a year, in spring and autumn. In spring, only the presidents meet, whereas the autumn meeting gathers both presidents (seniors) and juniors.



Section Denmark has had the pleasure of chairing the Gimborn Talks in 2024. The spring meeting was held in the Faroes and was widely attended. The autumn meeting was according to tradition held at Gimborn. Unfortunately, the attendance at the autumn meeting was lesser than at the spring meeting; both meetings, though, were productive.

Originally the Gimborn Gespräche was convened as an informal discussion forum without any stipulated agenda for the meeting. Thus, today's meetings within the so-called seniors' group are still convened around a very loose agenda, as well as they are conducted in such a manner that the agenda is rather a loose coat than a tight bodysuit.

In other words, today we have an agenda for the meetings but we are true to the original idea behind the Gimborn Talks, namely the informal discussion of ideas, views and the good of the IPA.

When we in 2016 decided to also convene a group of juniors it was due to the fact that we fairly quickly within the seniors' group realised that our top priority is, was and will be recruitment and retention. If we are not able to recruit and retain, the IPA will be a declining organisation. The seniors, though, are best at fantasising about recruitment and retention, as we may only have vague ideas about what is really on top of mind of the younger members, who are the seeds of the future IPA.

Thus, a juniors' group was established with the purpose of becoming a think tank for inter alia recruitment and retention ideas. In autumn the two groups convene simultaneously at Gimborn, and the synergy that is derived from convening simultaneously – apart from the obvious synergetic value that flows from the Turm Bar – lies in the experience of the seniors combined with the drive and (sometimes) daredevilness of juniors. When wrapping up the day in autumn, the juniors and seniors meet together, and the juniors present the results of their discussions to the seniors.

The seniors' group should not be seen as a filter that blocks new ideas. It is rather so that we – being national presidents or their representatives – support and sustain as well as suggest possible further development of the ideas that come from the juniors' group. At least seen from my perspective, this is true synergy to the benefit of the IPA.





Now you may ask yourself if anything has really come about from this forum?

In fact, some highly appreciated initiatives are born out of the Gimborn Talks. There have, e.g., been attempts to establish an IPA app on national level. However, the idea of an international IPA app was initially discussed within the juniors' group and attempts to establish such an app were made. As you may know, the idea has now been taken on board by the IEB, and we are close to having an international IPA app.

Another commendable initiative is the IPA on Patrol in various member countries. The idea of On Patrol encompasses both IPA's social, professional and international aims. You get to meet colleagues from other countries learning about the host country's policing – but also learning from the colleagues from other countries at the same time – and, naturally, enjoying yourself in the company of these colleagues.

So, to revert to the headline's second question: Yes! The Gimborn Talks are indeed needed. For me personally – and I know that my fellow national presidents feel the same way – they are a unique opportunity to exchange and develop views on the IPA's development, both nationally and internationally; and the juniors' group is a unique laboratory for developing new ideas beneficial to the IPA.

I recently represented IPA Section UK at the 2024 Gimborn Talks, hosted by IPA Denmark.

The event was held at the IPA Education Centre, IBZ Schloss Gimborn, just outside Colognein Germany. The whole event lasted four days with two travel days factored into the busy schedule.

After flying into Cologne Bonn Airport early Thursday morning, I was collectedby a shuttle bus organised by the IPA Education Centre. I joined four members of IPA Section Ireland before heading to the historic site of Gimborn. After a 30 – 45 minute commute, we arrived and were immediately offered lunch in the local restaurant which was situated in the main reception.

Once we had finished our food, we all retired back to our rooms to unpack, & in my case nap! Reenergised & slightly more awake, I took myself for a walk around the stunningly beautiful grounds although being alittle chilly!

Later that evening, I attended the infamous honesty bar located within the castle. The bar, which has no staff, is self-operated by its patrons who fill out

their own receipt of what they have drunk throughout the night.

Once you leave the bar, you post your receipt into a post box, which will then be invoiced to you to pay upon your departure.

This is where I met the vast majority of the other attendee's amongst other IPA members from across the world. People drinking in the bar ranged from

European men & women who had met at previous IPA events to members from Australia & the USA having just met on a drone course at Gimborn. Pictured on the left, is Nic Bannan, an Australian Police Sargent who specialises in bomb disposal and riot training. Having just completed his drone Pilot course, through the IPA, we exchanged patches and spoke at length about the similarities & differences of Policing in the UK & the land down under!



On Day 2, after breakfast we were collected and taken to Brauwelt Koln which the oldest Brewery that makes Kolch. Kolch is a type of German beer, which is only made in Cologne due to German laws. Our tour guide was a retired Cologne Police Officer & current serving IPA member. Coincidently, he had worked with the Irish IPA president, over 10 years ago on an exchange programme between Germany & Ireland. As part of the tour, we had a tasting session where we sampled some of the brewery's most popular & specialist products.

Following the Brewery, we were taken into the City of Cologne. The Denmark IPA, as hosts, took us to a traditional German restaurant. After yet more Kolch beer, we ventured out into the city and became a small group of the thousands of tourists also in the City Centre. Most noticeably, we visited the Cologne Dom, which is a stunning cathedral in the heart of Cologne. We spent the rest of the afternoon & evening in the City and visited a variety of shops, restaurant, bars & other tourist attractions before travelling an hour back to Gimborn.







Day 3. The day of both the Senior and Junior Gimborn Talks. Starting with the "Formal" introductions whereby we all told the group our names, Country's &roles within the IPA. Then, both groups separated. The senior group was made of Section presidents or people high up within the IPA across Europe. I stayed downstairs with the Junior group, which consisted of young IPA members. The morning was spent discussing the IPA and how can we recruit more young serving members and make the IPA more appealing. Ideas such as working with the Police federations/unions, up-to-date & modern posters,leaflets & socialmedia were all discussed. After lunch, these ideas were discussed with the Seniorswho returned to our conference room. This was after a video call with the IPA president, Martin Hoffmann.

After the call & discussions, we had a presentation delivered to us by Sven Maertens. Sven is an IPA Belgium member but is on the panel of members working to design & deliver the in-coming IPA member App. The app will replace a variety of thingsincluding the out dated travelforms & make it easier for IPA members to communicate! A video of the presentation is on the IPA's YouTube account.

The meetingswere then concluded with a toast to the IPA &photos in the scenic groundsof the Gimborn castle.

After our final night in the Gimborn bar, the majority of group had left Gimborn in the early hours to travel back to their

respective countries. However, my flight was not until 21:55Hrs, German time. I was offered 2 options by the very kind staff at Gimborn. The first, stay at Gimborn until 17:00Hrs and get a shuttle bus on my own to the airport. Spending a lonely & boring day at the Castle with limited things to do. Alternatively, they offered me a space on the earlier shuttle with the Austrians. This dropped me at the airport at 10:00Hrs, 12 hours before my flight. As a Police officer, I try to be early to everything however, this was going to be some kind of world record!

Attached to the Cologne Airport, is a small train Station. With some help of a helpful German man, who had returned from Spain, I bought a ticket for the S19 train for 3 euro's which took me into the city centre. Once there, I deposited my bags into a underground locker system which then provided me with a carpark style ticket.





I then ventured back into the City Centre and noticed there were even more people walking around and a lot more noise coming from the streets. It soon became apparent that the Cologne Half Marathon was taking place with THOUSANDS of participants. After walking around for a while, I stopped for a coffee whilst watching the runners go by.

I then ventured further around the city, finding things to do rather than spending hours in the airport. I looked around the inside of the Cologne Dom, going round the German Art Museum & walking along the riverside. Whilst walking around, I noticed a large Police presence near an office block. Being the nosey Police officer I am, I asked! The officers I spoke to explained that they were specialist cops bought in from elsewhere to deal with demonstrations or as we call them in the UK, protests!

As I was leaving the street, I noticed an officer holding a camera. The camera was the same one I use in the UK for evidence gathering. After naively asking him if he spoke English, I explained that I was also an "EG".

He then proceeded to show me around his surveillance style van and all the kit he uses to do the role. He asked questions about my role in the UK & explained he had been in training for 3 years and that was on his 12th week in the wild! I also took the opportunity to talk about the IPA to him and his colleagues!

I then offered him to swap patches and I gained one more to my growing collection from Germany.

After a spot of lunch in a hidden beauty spot, I have made my way to the airport, still hours early!

Whilst at the airport, I got speaking to another German Police officer. This time, he was part of the airport boarder team...

This gave me yet another opportunity to talk about the IPA to another officer that had very limited knowledge about what the IPA has to offer. That is when I got my last trade of my trip. My last patch & pin badge I had to swap. In return, a vibrant boarder Police Force patch.



After a quick flight back to the UK, I was then got home knowing that I was back to work within 8 hours! The trip offered me so many things. From my first time travelling on my own, meeting new friends & contacts from across Europe to getting to understand what the IPA has to offer to myself and others. I'd like to think this trip has shaped me as a more rounded individual too along with more Policing knowledge that I can take back to UK Policing, specifically back to Thames Valley Police!

A special mention to Karen Duckworth who invited me onto this trip and put me in touch with a number of key contacts across the UK.

REPORT ON WORKPLACE WELLBEING SEMINER AT GIMBORN

We were taken through the amazing programme by four facilitators namely Hellen McGrath, Patricia Devine, Joe Clare and Hugh Cullen. The participants were 14 from different countries. The interactions were well coordinated and my expectations were well met.

Workplace wellbeing was defined as all aspects of working life. Quality and safety of the physical environment, on how workers feel about work and work organization. It has three pillars which includes physical wellbeing, mental wellbeing and social wellbeing.

There is need for organization to have a framework on health and wellbeing {strategic plan}. The framework has 8 steps;-

- 1. Executive summary
- 2. Current position
- 3. Future statement-vision and mission statement
- 4. Health and wellbeing values-includes culture, justice, resilience, togetherness, development
- 5. Strategic goals
- 6. Strategic objectives statements-The objectives will be based on the SMART framework. That is specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time bound.

Key Performance indicators-They measure the performance of the strategic objectives. The indicators are specifically designed for each strategic objective.

Roles and responsibilities

- 7. Communication-There must be a communication plan which includes;-reciprocity, commitment, social proof, liking, authority and scarcity.
- 8. Conclusion-to conclude the plan.

For one to develop a workplace wellness programme that lasts, it is important to follow the following steps;-

- Grow leadership commitment and alignment.
- Create a team of wellness champions.
- Gather meaningful data.

- Evaluate, celebrate and iterate



There are 8 dimensions of wellness as follows:-

Emotions, Spiritual, Intellectual, Physical, Environmental, Financial, Occupation, Social.

Another area well covered was the survey questionnaire. The purpose of survey is to assess the current state of employee health and wellbeing, identify areas of improvement and develop strategies to support a healthier workplace.

well-being. In light of this, the International Police Association of Kenya organised the event to unite our colleagues from around the world, foster closer relationships, and enhance our networks.




Mr. Ojuok explained the main objectives of friendship week to be:



Between 29th September 2024 and 4th October 2024 four serving Portuguese Police Officers, members of the I.P.A. Southern Delegation Portugal, came to Lincolnshire and were hosted by four serving Lincolnshire Police Officers, all members of the Lincolnshire Branch I.P.A.

A very varied and full-on week of activities ensued in Lincolnshire. The main theme for the visit was Summertime Policing:

Lincolnshire has a vast increase in its population over the summer months with tourists from all over the United Kingdom and indeed the world visiting the area. It also has the largest concentration of mobile homes/static caravans/touring caravans in the whole of Europe. The Southern Delegation of the Portuguese I.P.A. Police the Albufeira/Algarve area of Portugal and have similar Policing challenges with a great influx of tourists to the area, during the summer.

The object was to exchange Policing practices from both areas, particular picking up on best practice issues and innovative ways to deal with the problems faced by both countries when dealing with tourists.

The Portuguese officers arrived on a very early flight from Faro, and did not get to their hosts until about 4am on the Monday morning. So once up the visitors had a whistle stop tour of Lincoln and some of its famous tourist/landmarks, including the Castle and Cathedral. The guests and their hosts and other members involved in the visit had an evening meal at one of the local hostelries.

Tuesday morning saw the officers visit Lincoln Police Station, where they went on patrol (separately) with officers from Lincoln. This saw them being present when an arrest was made and also at the execution of a warrant. The Poruguese officers were amazed that such work was carried out by officers who were not armed. After their patrol, there was a visit to the International Bomber Command Centre, where they had a quick guided tour of the location and also saw the I.P.A. stone in the Ribbon of Remembrance there. The afternoon saw a visit to Police H.Q. Nettleham, where they met with the Chief Constable, Mr Paul Gibson, for approx. an hour, where local "tourist" issues and challenges were discussed. A tour of the Force Control Room and a quick tour of the Armed Response Vehicle, and a chat with the officers followed.



Wednesday morning the group visited the "Home of the International Police Association" Skegness, where the founder Arthur Troop served. They went out on patrol with local officers who showed them the area, the large number of caravans there, and they were also involved with local immediate response calls.

This was followed by a presentation from Supt. Lee St. Quinten on a Problem-Solving Policing Project in the Skegness area and the east coast towns close by. The Portuguese then also gave a presentation re the Policing in Portugal. At the end of that day was a visit to a local Brewery (Batemans) at Wainfleet, where they had a guided tour of the which was celebrating Brewery, it's 150th anniversary, followed by a meal there.



Thursday started with a visit to Boston Police Station where they received a presentation from Insp. Cotton on a local project there involving a Problem-Solving initiative re the diversity of the area, which included a number of other partners in the area working together. Thursday afternoon saw a visit to the Lincolnshire Police Dog School where they were able to witness officers training the variety of Police dogs, there are in Lincolnshire and also a visit to the Accident Reduction/Prevention dept.



Thursday evening being their last evening was a Presentation dinner which included senior officers from Lincolnshire Police who had been very helpful and supportive of the visit. Various presentations to all concerned took place.

Friday morning saw an additional, unplanned visit to Lincoln Guildhall where there was a guided tour and the group met with the Sheriff of Lincoln, the Lincoln City Mayor and they were able to view the historic meeting rooms there and the regalia owned by the City.

IPA SOUTH AFRICA CHALLENGE COIN INITIATIVE

IPA JOHANNESBURG REGION'S CHALLENGE COIN INITIATIVE (SECTION SOUTH AFRICA)



For centuries, challenge coins have been a symbol of camaraderie and honour, being used to commemorate achievements both great and small. Today, these tokens also represent unity and at times even act as confirmation of membership. Forging a strong bond amongst those who possess them remains an important part of the ownership and exchange of such coins.

In February 2018 Gordon Billing, the then chairperson of IPA Johannesburg Region, conceived the idea of introducing "challenge coins" into the local IPA. Landscape in South Africa. This was not a new concept in the bigger picture but was a first for the South African Section.

Gordon arranged for the design and pressing of the first coins for IPA Region 19 (the Johannesburg Region). He opted to use the "old mine head" design which was adopted by the founding members when the Region was formed in May 1983. The mine-head represented Johannesburg as the location of the first gold rush back in 1886 and it continues to symbolise the Region to this day.

The entertainment officer at the time, Claude Malan, applied and expanded the use of IPA challenge coins when he became the Chairperson of the Region. Following the launch of the challenge coin of IPA Johannesburg in 2028, he also created a social media Challenge Coin Group to encourage cohesion amongst IPA members and friends, not only within the Johannesburg Region but between other South African Regions as well.

The Johannesburg Region's Challenge Coin became a soughtafter piece, being the original coin introduced to the South Africa Section. Since its launch in Johannesburg, numerous South African Regions have designed and produced their own challenge coins, strengthening the solidarity between our local IPA Regions.

The most recent development is the collection and exchange of challenge coins with foreign IPA

Sections, thereby building friendships and creating unity in IPA worldwide.

All in all, a lot of FIRSTS, thanks to the Johannesburg Region's initiative. Apart from the National IPA coin unveiled on 31 May 2023, various other South African Regions have followed suit with the likes of the Free State, North West and Kannaland. Exciting to note that more is to follow...

IPA BRAZIL FAVELA ON DUTY



In September 2024 (03-11) the IPA Brazil Academic Center developed as a pilot project, a special International Police Exchange, with a "police knowledge" course for IPA members in the city of Rio de Janeiro/Brazil, called: "FAVELA ON DUTY".

The police exchange, with official certification, had the didactic-pedagogical objective of bringing to the knowledge of IPA police officers around the world who are interested in the operational activity of urban confrontation, the experience of the Brazilian Police in this context. On September 3, 2024, under the coordination of the academic area of IPA Brazil in the region of the state of Rio de Janeiro, 17 police officers from Germany, Spain, the Netherlands and Belgium began the course inherent to the exchange in the academic knowledge part and then entered the practical part, when it was demonstrated "in loco" how the police in Brazil acts in this area of national public security that involves the social issue of the "Favela" and its problems with drug trafficking.

Lastly, with a duration of 13 days, the police officers who were members of IPA and enrolled in "Favela on Duty" had the opportunity to experience one of the realities of the police in Brazil, and certainly in various parts of the planet, given their own peculiarities. However, it was not only in the police world that these police officers in the course experienced, as part of the curriculum included knowledge of Brazilian culture, cuisine and tourism, something necessary and inherent to being a police officer, since the police, for IPA Brazil, are not functional objects, but rather human beings who act in defense of society.









IPA BRAZIL FAVELA ON DUTY



For the Academic Center of IPA Brazil, the results proposed for the development of "Favela on Duty" reached the necessary levels so that we can use the word: "It was a success". A success that resulted in numerous requests from IPA police officers for a new exchange program in 2025, which was approved by the National Council of IPA Brazil and the Academic Center of IPA Brazil is already starting to prepare it on a larger scale than the objectives proposed in the initial project.

We will soon be reporting on the fulfilment of the expectations of our IPA members around the world. Soon, "Favela on Duty 2".

POLICE FORCES WELCOME INTERNATIONAL COLLEAGUES TO COMBAT VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND GIRLS



In a display of international solidarity and partnership working, colleagues from Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire, and Hertfordshire police forces joined officers from British Overseas Territories (BOT) last week to tackle violence against women and girls (VAWG).

The Inclusivity Through Shared Learning inaugural conference, organised by Women of Colour in Policing (WoCiP) BCH, in collaboration with the International Police Association (IPA) and the BOT Women of Colour in Policing movement, was hosted across the three forces between Tuesday 1 and Friday 4 October.

Attendees included 13 safeguarding, child protection and control room colleagues from Anguilla, Bermuda, British Virgin Ascension Island, St Helena, Montserrat, Turks and Caicos, and the Cayman Islands. They were joined by national policing leads, founders of domestic abuse charities, NHS representatives, academics, a criminal barrister, author and an oral historian who flew in especially from Connecticut, USA. All shared their perspectives and strategies to improve the reporting and prosecutions of domestic abuse, coercion and control, rape and other sexual offences.

WoCiP BCH Founder, Sergeant Sandra Smith, said: "We are proud to have hosted this event which focused unflinchingly and unapologetically on the travesty that is violence against women and girls. Too many women and girls are killed or abused at the hands of men. Too few women have the confidence to report these crimes and when they do, fewer still lead to successful prosecutions."

Maria Stanley, Foreign, Commonwealth Development Office (FCDO) Gender Programme Lead the British Overseas Territories, emphasised: "Urgent change is needed within societies worldwide. This event, hosted by WoCiP BCH across Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire, and Hertfordshire police forces, provided a critical platform to examine the pressing issues and consider how policing, both locally and globally, can contribute to improving outcomes for female victims of male perpetrated violence. By aligning with SDG5, a sustainable development goal aimed at achieving gender equality and empowering all women and girls, this work focuses on a broad range of issues to dismantle systemic genderbased discrimination."

One initiative shared during the event was Op Soteria. Funded by the Home Office and delivered by the NPCC and College of Policing, Op Soteria is committed to delivering a victim-centred, suspect-focused approach to rape investigations and prosecutions.

ACC Dee Perkins, NPCC Op Soteria Strategic Programme Director, said: "All forces in England and Wales have now adopted Op Soteria and we are seeing the change Soteria is driving in terms of creating a victim centred culture, better understanding of the context of offending and improvements in investigation standards.

"Charge rates for adult rape have trebled since the introduction of Soteria and victim attrition is reducing but this is very much the start of our journey of transformational cultural change to improve the policing response and give victims the service they deserve.

"These crimes know no boundaries which is why the Inclusivity Through Shared Learning event is so important. By sharing Op Soteria learning with our overseas colleagues, we can work together to ensure the needs of the victim are put first throughout the report to court process, wherever these crimes are committed."

DS Sabrina Lightbourne, who works for the Turks and Caicos Islands police service in the Safeguarding and Public Protection unit, found the event informative and believes the event will make a difference. She said: "More action needs to be taken in my country, so I am grateful to have had this opportunity to learn how different forces respond to violence against women and girls. I was very interested to hear about Op Soteria and will be looking to adopt this approach within our organisations back home."





Other sessions included a bespoke theatre performance to stimulate conversations around domestic abuse and victim disengagement, insights from a Black female author and an oral historian, plus presentations by JESIP and the College of Policing.

Ensuring women from diverse ethnic backgrounds are represented within policing was a core theme throughout the event. Euwonka Selver, representing the Turks and Caicos Islands consular office in said: "Policing should mirror London, communities they represent so I was delighted to see so many female officers from across the British Overseas Territories working proactively with colleagues in Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire, and Hertfordshire, to protect women and girls both in the UK and abroad. This strengthening of ties can only improve our overall understanding of this critical issue and the action we take against it."

In a wider display of inclusion, children from the Chiswick School steel band, London, performed songs on the opening day of the event alongside MOBO award winner Samuel Dubois.

Sam Alexander, Assistant Lead for WoCiP BCH, "This event has been no mean feat, interweaving a rich and thought-provoking programme covering a multitude of issues relating to inclusion and VAWG with evening entertainment and some wonderful music by the Chiswick School steel band.

"The girls performing in that band represent exactly the people we seek to protect and are very much at the heart of this international learning event."

The event, which was sponsored by the FCDO and Integrated Security Funding (ISF), concluded with a closing ceremony and graduation of colleagues who recently completed the tri-force Becoming Career Ready Programme.

This programme, accredited by Skills for Justice, is aimed at career-mindedwomen from Black, Asian and other underrepresented ethnic backgrounds to give them a voice and encourage them to progress their careers within policing.

Reflecting on the four-day event, Det. Chief Supt. Rebecca Tipping said: "As deputy WoCiP BCH sponsor I was extremely proud to be part of an unforgettable week of activity which showed the power of working together and shared learning. Most importantly you could see the positive impact it had on everyone involved. It truly was an inspirational week of activity and great to see the difference the movement is continuing to make on the lives of people. My thanks and credit to the WoCiP BCH team and everyone involved for making the week so special."
