

Introduction from Chairperson Professional Commission Diego Trolese



Our World Congress (WC) recently concluded in the beautiful city of Krakow after two years of the IEB mandate and therefore halfway through my journey as Chairperson of the Professional Commission (PC) within the IEB.

After the initial period in 2023-2024, we agreed the projects that were previously organised and would continue and subsequently, with the recruitment of new commission members, necessary updates were made and new projects with new ideas were established.

All new initiatives were presented to the WC by the International President and the Secretary General and approved by the assembly, as new procedures and updates were communicated. The latest developments were particularly the new EDUCATION project, which establishes contacts and collaborations with other associations with which we share goals and various activities.





A meeting was also held between the project TTLLs, all present at the WC, with whom updates were shared on contacts, procedures, and related expenses, as well as on the Commission's future mandate plans.



Introduction from Chairperson Professional Commission Diego Trolese

The major changes, approved by the IEB and subsequently by the WC Delegates, include updates to the Procedures for new and existing projects; an increase in the per capita participation fee from €150.00 to €250.00, managed by the host Sections; and an increase in the Chairmen's budget for participating in the various initiatives and projects of the Commission members.

The IEB's support for the development of new projects and contacts was not lacking, as was the necessary long-term collaboration with the IBZ GIMBORN. New initiatives in this area include the launch of the first seminar to be held outside of Gimborn in Moldova and the online seminars scheduled for multiple editions, currently in Spanish.




The #SHEisIPA project no longer requires further information, as it has already been operational for a long time with many initiatives and a new seminar this year, which will once again take place in the splendid setting of Gimborn Castle.



The Arthur Troop Scholarship (ATS) project team led by Salvatore del Giglio has finalised and completed all operations with its collaborators, completing all procedures related to the 2026 project. There were 80 applications and 12 winners; See page 18 for the full list of winners.

The Young Police Officers Seminar (YPOS) also needs no further introduction. After last year's success in Vienna, the project is being hosted in November 2025 by the Romanian Section in the capital, Bucharest, with the participation of numerous members and a packed and exciting programme.

The presentation of the 2026 edition, which will be organised by the German Section, was also made during the WC.

In this context, as mentioned, the Strategic Young Member's Conference (SYMC) project has launched at took place in Gimborn from 5-7 September.



Previously integrated with YPOS, it has now been developed as a stand alone procedure by our committee with new procedures approved by the IEB and WC. Both projects will be managed by the Young Members team.

I'll conclude my brief note with an update on the 7 Regions Project, managed by our talented Vice President Oli Hoffmann, and where I have the honour of chairing the Northern Europe group. The first meeting took place in Vilnius, Lithuania earlier this year, and we had the opportunity to have our second physical meeting during World Conference in Krakow. We established shared guidelines, shared ideas and best practice and will schedule our next meeting for April 2026.

Celebrating 75 Years of Friendship 68th IPA World Congress in Kraków



The 68th IPA World Congress took place from 16-21 September 2025 in Kraków, Poland. Marking the 75th anniversary of the International Police Association, the congress was both a moment to reflect on the organisation's remarkable journey and a milestone in shaping its future. Delegates and observers from 65 countries gathered in a spirit of unity, continuity and confidence.

A Historic Congress

The official opening ceremony was held in the Wieliczka Salt Mine, a UNESCO World Heritage site that provided a truly unique backdrop for this anniversary his opening event. words. International President Martin Hoffmann underlined the importance of neutrality, solidarity and professional alobal exchange times uncertainty.



He also recalled his recent visit to Ukraine, highlighting the courage and resilience of IPA colleagues working under extraordinary conditions.

IPA Poland, under the leadership of Section President Piotr Wójcik, was warmly thanked for its excellent organisation and hospitality. With a record growth of more than 2,700 new members in the past year, IPA Poland was celebrated as the strongest growing section worldwide.



Decisions and Strategic Direction

The plenary sessions were marked by constructive and cooperative debate. Delegates worked together in a spirit of friendship and responsibility, ensuring that the key decisions for the future of the IPA were taken with broad support.

Among the motions adopted were:

- Reintroduction of interpretation: Simultaneous interpretation in the five official IPA languages (English, French, German, Spanish and Russian) will be reintroduced for future World Congresses.
- Suspension of IPA Russia: The suspension of IPA Russia was extended for a fourth year, with IPA Cyprus appointed to represent its interests during this period, without voting rights.
- Event subsidies: The standard subsidy for international events such as the Young Police Officers' Seminar (YPOS) and the Strategic Young Members' Conference (SYMC) was increased to €250 per participant, making it easier for young officers to participate.
- Future congresses and meetings: IPA Kenya's bid to host the IPA World Congress in 2029 received broad support, subject to final budget approval. IPA Portugal was confirmed as host of the next Hosting Sections Meeting, to be held in Lisbon in September 2026.



The sessions also confirmed the ongoing implementation of the IPA Strategy 2023–2027, which focuses on growth, inclusivity, professional exchange and sustainability.



A Gala Evening for the 75th Anniversary

The highlight of the congress week was the Gala Evening on 19 September, celebrating the 75th anniversary of the Association in a dignified and festive atmosphere.

Guests of honour included twelve former members of the International Executive Board and Professional Executive Bureau. At the forefront were the two former International Presidents, Armand Jaminet (Luxembourg) and Pierre-Martin Moulin (Switzerland). They were joined by Phyllis Nolan (Ireland), the first woman to serve on the International Board, followed by former Vice Presidents Haim Szmulewitz (Israel), Daniel Condaminas (France), Gal Sharon (Israel) and Kyriakos Karkalis (Greece). Completing the distinguished group were Romain Miny (Luxembourg), Ioannis Panoussis Stephen Crockard (United Kingdom), May-Britt Rönnebro (Sweden) and Demetris Demetriou (Cyprus). Their presence underlined leadership continuity of and foundation of the IPA.

A particularly moving moment was the premiere of the new IPA Song and video, created with contributions from many sections worldwide. It was received as a powerful symbol of unity and friendship across all continents.

Gratitude and Acknowledgements

At the close of the congress, the International President expressed his gratitude to all delegates for their constructive contributions, to the Polish organisers for their outstanding hospitality, and to the IEB, IAC and advisers for their tireless work. Above all, recognition was given to the many volunteers and partners whose support makes the life of the Association possible.



Looking Ahead - A Confident Future

Delegates left Kraków with a renewed sense of confidence and shared purpose. The decisions taken and the unity demonstrated once again showed that the IPA is more than an association: it is a worldwide family built on friendship.

Looking ahead, members can already anticipate the 69th IPA World Congress in Colombo, Sri Lanka, in 2026, as well as the Statutory Convention in Lisbon in 2026. Major events such as the IPA Games 2026 in Poland and further international seminars are also on the horizon.

After 75 years, the IPA is not slowing down. It is entering a new chapter with energy, inclusivity and a clear strategy. Friendship, solidarity and professional exchange will continue to be the driving forces that make the IPA the world's largest and most vibrant police association.

During the Opening Ceremony of the IPA World Congress, we were delighted to be introduced to the IPA Games 2026 Mascot – IPek.

Preparations are already underway, and IPA Poland warmly invites everyone to take part. The IPA Games are not only about sport, but also about friendship, teamwork, and international cooperation. Special Recognition for Members

During the World Congress, special recognition was given to two long-standing members of the IPA for their dedication and service to the Association.



Hubert Vitt (IPA Germany) was honoured for his outstanding commitment to the International Police Association. His contribution has been evident through his continuous attendance at World Congresses since 2007, as well as his dedicated service to the Professional Commission and, more recently, the Socio-Cultural Commission. Hubert joined the 68th IPA World Congress via live video conference, where he was formally recognised and presented with his award.

Ioannis Panousis (IPA Greece) was already in attendance at the IPA World Congress as a former PEB member invited to celebrate 75 years of IPA. Ioannis previously served as Assistant Secretary General from 2003 to 2006.

Vice President Oliver Hoffmann welcomed loannis to the stage to present him with his certificate in recognition for his service as Assistant Secretary General and for demonstrating exceptional commitment, leadership, and support in advancing the objectives and development of the IPA.

Congratulations to both of these most deserving members. It is important that we recognise those who dedicate their time, energy, and commitment to the IPA. Their contributions help our Association to grow, develop, and remain true to its values of friendship and service.



In 1949, a British police sergeant named Arthur Troop published an article in the Police Review under the pen name Aytee. In it, he expressed his conviction that international exchanges between police officers could create something far greater than professional contacts. As he wrote: "The existence of this scheme would do much to weld friendship into a great fellowship."

This simple but groundbreaking idea laid the foundation for the International Police Association. Troop, who had witnessed the devastation of the Second World War, believed that police officers could play a crucial role in overcoming divisions between nations.



At a time when Europe was recovering from destruction and the Cold War was beginning to cast its shadow, he envisioned an organisation where police officers could meet as friends, regardless of rank, nationality, religion, or political belief.

On 1 January 1950, Troop's vision became reality with the official foundation of the IPA in the United Kingdom. To symbolise neutrality and internationalism, he chose the motto in Esperanto: Servo per Amikeco – Service through Friendship. This was more than a phrase: it was a commitment to a way of life, to dialogue, and to peace.

The First World Congress - Eight Founding Sections

The idea spread rapidly across Europe. Only five years after its foundation, the IPA reached a historic milestone. On 16 September 1955, the first IPA World Congress was held in Paris. At this meeting, the IPA became a truly international body, and eight national sections were officially recognised as founding members:

- Belgium
- France
- Germany
- Ireland
- Luxembourg
- Netherlands
- Switzerland
- United Kingdom

This moment firmly anchored the IPA as a worldwide association, and it remains a cornerstone of our history.



Building Bridges in a Divided World

From its very beginning, the IPA offered something unique. During the decades of the Cold War, when nations were divided by ideology and politics, the IPA provided a neutral platform for police officers from East and West to meet, exchange experiences, and build friendships.

The organisation quickly became known for its three core pillars: professional development, social exchange, and cultural activities. Seminars, exchange visits, and later the Arthur Troop Scholarship and the Young Police Officers' Seminar gave members opportunities for learning and career development.

Friendship weeks, IPA Houses, and cultural competitions offered spaces for connection and understanding. At a time when Europe was recovering from destruction and the Cold War was beginning to cast its shadow, he envisioned an organisation where police officers could meet as friends, regardless of rank, nationality, religion, or political belief.

On 1 January 1950, Troop's vision became reality with the official foundation of the IPA in the United Kingdom. To symbolise neutrality and internationalism, he chose the motto in Esperanto: Servo per Amikeco – Service through Friendship. This was more than a phrase: it was a commitment to a way of life, to dialogue, and to peace.

Over time, the IPA also reached beyond its membership, earning consultative status with the United Nations, UNESCO, and the Organisation of American States – recognition of its contribution to peace, dialogue, and human rights.

Our Presidents Through the Years

Since 1955, the IPA has been led by a line of dedicated Presidents who carried Arthur Troop's vision forward. The first was André Roches of France (1955–1958), followed by Alphonse Smeyers of Belgium (1958–1961) and Herbert Kalicinsky of Germany (1961–1964), who was succeeded mid-term by Theo Mommsen. In the years that followed, the presidency passed to William C. F. Best of the United Kingdom (1964–1967), succeeded mid-term by Peter Matthews, and then to Peter J. Matthews himself (1967–1970). The next decades saw the leadership of Alan Holmquist of the Netherlands (1970–1973), Bernard Martinez of France (1973–1976), Harold "Harry" Wilson of Canada (1976–1979), and Karl Homma of Austria (1979–1982). The office was then held by Jürgen Klös of Germany (1982–1988), Roy Stragnér of Sweden (1988–1994), and Armand



Jaminet of Luxembourg (1994–2000). Entering the new millennium, **Michael Odysseos** of Cyprus served from 2000 to 2012, making him the longest-serving President in the history of the IPA. He was followed by **Pierre-Martin Moulin** of Switzerland, who guided the Association for more than a decade (2012–2023).




Since 2023, the presidency has been entrusted to Martin Hoffmann of Austria, who continues to build on this proud legacy together with his International Executive Board: Oliver Hoffmann of Germany as Vice President and Chair of the International Relations Commission, Jože Senica of Slovenia as Secretary General, Kyriakos Perikleous of Cyprus as Treasurer of Finances, Jean Pierre Allet of Switzerland as Treasurer Social Affairs, Diego Trolese of Italy as Chair of the Professional Commission, Christos Parginos of Greece as Chair of the Socio-Cultural

Commission, and **Clive Wood** of the United Kingdom as Head of Administration. United as a team, they are committed to ensuring that the IPA not only honours its remarkable past but also prepares for a strong and sustainable future.

Honouring All Who Served

The IPA has never been the work of Presidents alone. Since 1955, 140 different colleagues have served on the Permanent Executive Bureau or the International Executive Board. They represented more than 25 countries across all continents, each contributing their skills, dedication, and friendship to the growth of the Association.

It is thanks to this collective effort that the IPA has survived and thrived for 75 years. Their commitment ensured that the principles of Arthur Troop's Aytee article were not only preserved but transformed into living reality for hundreds of thousands of members worldwide.



Strategy 2023–2027 – Planting the Tree of Growth

As we celebrate our 75th anniversary, it is also essential to look ahead. The current strategy for 2023-2027 sets out ambitious projects that are already shaping the future of the IPA. These include the strengthening of our professional development through initiatives such as the Arthur Troop Scholarship, the Young Police Officers' Seminar, and the expansion of training opportunities with more online formats and seminars hosted by national sections. Our social and cultural work continues to grow, from the IPA Games and the promotion of youth activities, to artistic projects such as the new IPA Art Book by Antonio Montejano<mark>, a</mark>nd international campaigns like #SHEisIPA, which highlight diversity, equality, and inclusion. Sustainability remains central, with initiatives such as Green IPA, which reflects our responsibility towards the environment.

Equally important is the growth of our Association, both in terms of membership and the creation of new sections worldwide. Events designed for younger members are receiving special attention, ensuring that the next generation finds its place and its voice within the IPA. Digitalisation also plays a key role, with the further development of the IPA App and our modernised website, both designed to bring members closer together and make our global community more accessible.

These projects are not meant to end in two years' time. On the contrary, many of the investments we make today will only reveal their full impact over the next five to ten years. The strategy therefore serves as a foundation for long-term growth: the outcomes of our work in training, diversity, sustainability, and international cooperation will extend well beyond 2027, strengthening the IPA for future generations.

A Personal Word of Thanks

At this special moment in our history, I want to express my heartfelt gratitude to all who have served. To the former members of the PEB and IEB, who dedicated their time and leadership to the international development of our Association. To the previous and current staff of the International Administration Centre in Nottingham, whose tireless support has been vital for the work of every International Executive Board. And to every member worldwide, whose commitment to friendship and service has kept Arthur Troop's vision alive for 75 years.

Let us continue this journey in friendship – united by our motto Servo per Amikeco – and ensure that the legacy we inherited remains strong for generations to come.

My long term contact with the IAC and its staff.

There were of course a number of short term IAC staffers over the years but I can nominate three distinct eras during my time: Wendy and Leslie with their institutional memory in an analogue age. Elke and Kerry bringing sharp fresh change in procedures and efficiency and finally Hana and Lisa in our new AI embracing digital world.

There was the annual hard copy IPA Information Guide to produce in 3 languages, later 4 with Spanish and this was labour intensive. It was expensive to put together, have professionally translated and printed, then posted to a large number of recipients at ever increasing cost. As it was an annual item, it was necessary to send out updates for recipients to amend their copies. I am trying to remember whether the early black and white newsletter was posted of faxed pre -email, but it was produced variously by Wendy with input from George Katsaropoulos, then from me. When Elke arrived she adopted the newsletter and modernised it really well. It became her favourite item of work and this continued with Hana who has again stamped her positive signature on it.

During the 1980s and 1990s, as a UK regional board member I had occasions to visit Fox and made a point of calling with the UK staff and IAC staff. From 1999, as a UK Vice President, I attended IEC meetings and World Congresses each year and often travelled with Wendy & Leslie to the venues. In 2003, I joined the IPC and looked after the AT Scholarship in its early years, so now had a working relationship with the IAC. After election to the PEB in Turkey in 2009, as AISG, I visited the IAC several times each year. Remember, this was pre smart phone and universal use of email, so the staff had to take multiple phone calls each day not to mention large amounts of post and low quality fax messages. Information exchange moved at what today seems a snail pace.




Visit from IPA Macau to IAC Office, Nottingham

The ATS as legacy to our founder Arthur Troop is a professional education and advanced training bursary with the aid of aiding IPA members in their professional careers. The Arthur Troop Scholarship is awarded to IPA members at the IPA World Congress which recently took place in Krakow, Poland. Each awardee may receive a bursary of up to €2500 which shall contribute to the seminar, conference or symposium fee, as well as travel and accommodation expenses.

The assessment board will review all applications and are evaluated using an assessment matrix. The Arthur Troop Scholarship is preferably awarded to at least one applicant from each continent, provided the application standard and quality is of the required standard.

All awardees are asked to submit reports and photos of the Arthur Troop Scholarship upon completion. Look out for stories from these awardees in the coming months.

IPA Collaboration With ASEANAPOL

During the IPA World Congress, delegates had the privilege of a presentation by Ltc. Col. Nguyen Hui Ngoc, who outlined ASEANAPOL's mission and vision. ASEANAPOL, the Association of Southeast Asian National Police Organisations, brings together police forces from countries including Thailand, Vietnam, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Brunei, Cambodia, Laos, and Myanmar.





Chairperson of the International Relations Commission, Oliver Hoffmann, is working closely with ASEANAPOL to explore opportunities for collaboration between ASEANAPOL and the IPA.

Currently, the IPA has limited representation in this region, making this partnership a significant opportunity for future growth and development. By fostering engagement with ASEANAPOL, the IPA can expand its international reach, build connections with police officers across Southeast Asia, and promote the values of friendship and professional exchange that are at the heart of the organisation.

This presentation highlighted the potential for mutual learning, knowledge sharing, and strengthening global police networks, paving the way for meaningful partnerships in a region where IPA membership has historically been limited.

Strategic Young Members Conference 2025 at IBZ Gimborn – A Success Story!

From September 5–7, 2025, young members of the International Police Association (IPA) gathered at the historic IBZ Gimborn for this year's Strategic Young Members Conference (SYMC). With participants from across Europe, Asia, and Africa, the event once again proved to be an inspiring platform for exchange, innovation, and international friendship.



A Strong Start

The conference began on Friday with a warm welcome and introductions. Participants shared their backgrounds, IPA roles, and expectations before diving into group work and poster sessions. These first activities already sparked lively discussions on communication, leadership, and the role of young members in the IPA. IPA Armenia August Activities

On August 20, at the IPA Armenia office we received a guest from the IPA Germany, police officer working in Darmstadt Marcel Aldorf.

During the meeting we discussed some nuances of the Armenian and German police, exchanged gifts, and Marcel Aldorf was also awarded a medal.

On August 28, the IPA Section of Armenia celebrated the 35th anniversary of the creation of the Armenian special forces. The President of the IPA Armenia Grigor Sargsyan is one of the founders of the Armenian special forces.







On August 28-31, 2025, IPA President Martin Hoffmann, together with IPA Estonia President Uno Laas, visited the capital of Ukraine, the city of Kyiv, at the invitation of their Ukrainian colleagues.

The programme began with a meeting with the Head of the National Police of Ukraine, General Ivan Vyhivskyi. Along with the head of police were his deputies and other staff members. From the Ukrainian Section of the IPA, the meeting was attended by Oleksandr Zarubytskyi, Acting President of the Section,

and Oleksandr Yarmysh, member of the National Executive Committee and Head of the Professional Commission.

The meeting was well-organised and held in a warm, constructive atmosphere. Attendees honoured the memory of the fallen with a moment of silence, after which they discussed issues united by a single theme - how to improve the interaction of IPA, its Ukrainian Section, and the National Police.

Each participant shared their views. The Head of Police, as an IPA member, was invited at one of the regional police chiefs' meetings to express his personal attitude toward the Ukrainian Section of IPA and to direct his colleagues accordingly.

Much was discussed about preparing joint sports teams to participate in IPA competitions, as well as the idea of organising participation for athletes with disabilities.

Attention was also given to organising recreation and psychological rehabilitation for the children of fallen police officers, improving cooperation in the scientific and practical sphere, and other issues. At the end of the meeting, which lasted three times longer than planned, souvenirs were exchanged according to tradition.



After a substantive meeting with the leadership of the National Police, our guests and their accompanying delegation proceeded to Irpin and Bucha. The names of these small towns near Kyiv are today known far abroad. At the entrance to Irpin, we saw a large destroyed bridge which was blown up by Ukrainian patriots, to defend Kyiv.



Guests laid flowers and honoured the memory of the deceased residents honouring a minute's silence following the devastations of the ongoing war. A representative of the City Council presented the attendees with a photo exhibition depicting the reason events in Bucha.



Today, Bucha and Irpin look very different than they did three years ago. The cities are quickly recovering and improving their appearance daily. The guests were keen to visit the Irpin City Police Department building, which has been truly rebuilt from the ashes, and familiarised themselves with its technical equipment.

On the way back to Kyiv, the guests were shown some of the consequences of air raids on the capital.



The working day for the IPA President and his delegation concluded at the National Administrative Centre. Mr. Hoffmann reviewed the financial documents regarding the distribution of financial assistance from the IPA to members of the Ukrainian Section. At the end, he stated that the work carried out and the information provided deserved high recognition.

The second day of the visit took place at the National Academy of Internal Affairs. It began with a business meeting with representatives of the Academy's leadership - Vice-Rector Professor Serhii Cherniavskyi and Head of the International Department Oleksandr Zhovtiuk. The guests were introduced to the system of training future law enforcement officers, with emphasis placed on modern approaches education that meet the realities of service during wartime. We discussed prospects for cooperation in education, research projects, and professional practice exchange.



The guests showed great interest in the exhibition of the Museum of Police History and Criminology. Afterwards, the delegation travelled to the Academy's training base in the village of Vita Poshtova. The guests visited practical training grounds where cadets practice skills in responding to emergencies, apprehending offenders, conducting investigative actions, and other elements of professional training. They also inspected classrooms equipped with modern technology, spoke with cadets, and took photographs with them.



The third day of our friends' stay in the capital of Ukraine began with a visit to Mykhailivska Square, where they spent considerable time at the Wall of Remembrance, gazing at the countless photographs of heroes who gave their lives for Ukraine, among them our police brothers. Tears were visible in the eyes of Martin and Uno.



On Andriyivskyi Descent, known here as Kyiv's Montmartre, the guests were drawn to the art fair, where they even considered some of the paintings. Naturally, they admired the immortal creation of Rastrelli - St. Andrew's Church.

The programme continued with a walk through Old Kyiv, including a coffee break in one of the city's popular cafés, which at that hour was almost fully packed. They also showed interest in the Golden Gate, the Opera Theatre, and other landmarks. The guests were equally delighted by the view of the Dnipro River from the observation deck near the Museum of the History of the War.

At 2 p.m., a working meeting took place with members of the National Executive Council of IPA Ukraine. Acting President Oleksandr Zarubytskyi, in his opening remarks, briefly informed those present about the implementation of the visit's programme and then gave the floor to the guests. Martin Hoffmann and Uno Laas shared in detail with their Ukrainian colleagues their impressions of their stay in the capital and highly praised the organisation of the visit. The IPA President also provided a detailed briefing on new approaches in the work of the International Executive Board and the IPA as a whole, and answered questions.

After an exchange of souvenirs, the communication continued in a warm and friendly atmosphere. In the evening, the guests were accompanied to the Central Railway Station.







These fascinating inputs covered topics as varied as basic forensics at a scene, body recovery on the railway and disaster victim identification at major incidents like Grenfell Tower, the Manchester Arena bombing and the Croydon tram crash.

"Modern Forensic Methods" - Gimborn August 2025



I retired in 2023, having completed just over 30 years both as a Special Constable and then as a regular with Surrey Police, transferring to the Met for my last five years. In my time I did all manner of uniform roles, ending up as a full-time tactical firearms commander.

Since retiring I've started a business as a police advisor/consultant to Film and TV companies and have already done some interesting pieces of work for BBC, ITV and Sky productions. I'm conscious though that I have a knowledge gap when it comes to forensic investigations and so signed up to attend this course at the IPA's castle in Gimborn.

I last attended Gimborn in November 2004 when I gave a presentation about the Special Constabulary. The castle looks as splendid as ever, especially in the warm sunshine which made the week even better!

This week long course attracted delegates from Germany (Federal Police and Bonn City Police), Cypress and Romania (various CID, forensic and police departments) plus the lone representative from the UK - me!



During the week, we heard presentations about methods for lifting fingerprint marks from organic substances (fruit, leaves, even human skin), and an interesting case study from Romania, where a murder suspect was identified through clothing marks left in mud at the scene.

One particularly unusual presentation - a university in Germany has developed a method of comparing the skeletal features of an offender on CCTV to suspects in custody with a high level of confidence. This method involves scanning the scene with existing 3D technology, but also scanning the suspect via a turntable and multiple cameras.





Gimborn Castle and Modern Police Work: Cybercrime and Digital Investigation Methods

COLOGNE (GERMANY) - A stone's throw from Cologne airport, the International Police Association manages a continuous study and information center for police officers of any function and rank, at an international level. It is the only one in the world as an institution of the entire world police organisation and as many as 2500 people take advantage of its seminars every year.

The topics covered are numerous and range across various themes: for example on modern society and the role that the police can play in it, drug addiction, juvenile delinquency, terrorism, security not only in Europe, but also in other countries such as the United States, Turkey, Japan and China. The pedagogical methods used are somewhat different from those followed for the training of young policemen.



The internationality of the seminars increasingly becomes the predominant quality of the IPA Castle. It was already in the first seminars held in Gimborn that IPA members from different countries, such as Austria, Switzerland, Luxembourg, Belgium, the Netherlands and Scandinavia, where German is also spoken, participated, contributing to a valid international exchange of police experiences.

For some years now, in addition to seminars in German, conferences on international topics have also been organised in other languages, in English, French, Dutch and Italian.



Speaking of the Italian seminar, in June it was the turn of the one dedicated to modern policing and with the eloquent title: "Modern police work: cybercrime and the professional use of digital investigation methods". I've always wondered if my parents had remained stateside, if I would have chosen a career in law enforcement as I have living in the UK as a Bobby.





I am guilty of watching US cop shows on a regular basis and being in awe of the muscle cars, uniform, and sense of family they have in the stations.

I have to admit that I was very apprehensive about the trip, and it was a big unknown for me as I had never done anything with the IPA—not even an online seminar—so I was jumping in at the deep end. I was going to board a plane and head to Green Bay and hope that the a guy called Joe, who I had been talking to, was true to his word and had someone waiting for me at the airport.

Joe Johnson was not only true to his word but surpassed my expectations. I was met off the plane by a member of his team, and from that moment on, I can only describe what followed as 5-star hospitality.

The seminar commenced and 31 cops were bundled into a lecture hall. They came from PSNI, Kenya, Belgium, Germany, Denmark, Japan, Maldives, Gibraltar, Australia, and of course England.

All these officers were from all over the world and within hours of being with them all, one thing was obvious, we were all Cops!



We were all dealing with the same crimes, the same problems, and enjoyed the same successes. Each officer represented their home country and force like true professionals, and we were all clearly there not only for the experience but to develop ourselves as officers. It was obvious to me that from day one I had made the right decision to attend, and this was validated as the days progressed, and I experienced the training and social events.

Day two began with the physical side of the training and a trip to a shooting range. Not only did I get to dress up as a Sheriff but also try my hand at firing a gun.

Now, as I was the only UK officer who did not carry a firearm and the UK being the only nation at the seminar whose officers don't carry a gun as standard, my odds of being one of the better participants were low, and after the handgun firing session, it was confirmed that I was a terrible shot.(I did hit the target once, but it was in error). When we progressed to the high-powered rifle, I was much better and didn't miss once, however, that was due to the gun and not the talent.

We then moved on to searching a large area as if we were looking for an active shooter, and this is when it hit me. The USA cop shows I watch, and documentaries are not just entertainment on the television they are real. The cops that were delivering this training to me were teaching this as gun violence and this is a real daily threat. The officers come into work each shift with the possibility of being shot at. One of the teachers Jeremy Stover with the Ashwaubenon Public Safety Department, told us a story of when he had an active shooter in a casino, reinforcing the dark reality that cops, not just in the USA, face each day with gun crime. In latter days of the seminar, we also did active shooter training in a local high school. From this visit, I can confirm that the high schools are like they are in the movies, but the threat of high school shootings are at such a level that teachers are given similar training to what I was given which shocked me. I was given the opportunity to sweep corridors looking for an active shooter, which was made more realistic with a training backpack that set off shooting sound effects.

I also trained in OC spray, which is simply captor/lava spray most UK forces use. This training was delivered by retired NYPD and Chicago officers. Now, this was the day I was least excited about, as I thought it was going to just be the same as my own PST training I moan about each 12 months when I must requalify but I was wrong. Despite most of the techniques being the same, I took so much from the course. All officers were comparing notes on how they did it, and it made me think about different techniques and methods I would have never thought about and will be taking into my own policing style. We were at this point all close and getting on well, and you could say we were learning through friendship.



Now, I've saved the best experience of the trip to tell you about last.

The Police Lights of Christmas charity event Ride With The Lights. Each year, this charity holds events to raise money to buy gift cards that can then be distributed at Christmas by Police Departments to those in real need. 2025's Ride with the Lights had a twist—it had 31 international cops along for the ride, with local law enforcement agencies including the State Patrol! An emotional opening ceremony was conducted with a retired officer expressing his thanks to the charity that supported him whilst he was ill. The retired military displayed the flag while the national anthem was sung live. It felt like I was at the Super Bowl, and it's a moment I will never forget.

Once we arrived, we mingled with everyone there and members of the public were given a card with each nation's flag on, and they were tasked to get signatures for each nation. I had the pleasure of being selected to ride along in a Chevrolet Charger! (That was an item on my bucket list ticked off being in an American muscle car.)





Once we set off, approximately 182 Harley Davidsons led the pack, followed by 71 patrol cars mixed with 89 muscle cars, and to end the 15-minute procession was a big rig semi-truck. The noise was something to behold, and my arm was aching from waving at the public as we drove through small towns. When the route was completed, we arrived at Wisconsin International Raceway. It was a little quicker than usual, as all intersections had been cleared by the Wisconsin State Patrol. At the racetrack, everyone was allowed to give their vehicles a blast down the 1/4 mile drag track, where we again heard the national anthem, but this time, an eagle was released that so it could fly above us all whilst we paid our respects to the Star-Spangled Banner.

I spoke to cops from all different law enforcement agencies and managed to speak to a State Trooper being a roads policing officer, it's something I was desperate to do and of course we swapped patches. Over the course of the afternoon, I quickly became addicted to watching drag racing, and as always, a friendly local was at hand to talk to me and explain the finer details. The English accent is a plus in getting a conversation going.



The day, I think, went down for most of the officers in attendance as their best experience. To see so much support for law enforcement was overwhelming and a sharp reminder why all of us at the seminar joined the force. Sometimes I think we can all be guilty of forgetting why we joined the police, and events like this reminded us all why. The days event raised \$14,710, which was a massive success.

Each evening whilst in attendance brought social events, including a tour of the Green Bay Packers stadium, and as an operational football officer, I was really looking forward to the tour and Lambeau Field surpassed Wembley Stadium for me.

We had an evening of bowling, a tour around a brewery, and lots of war stories being shared in a recreation room while a sergeant from Chicago PD span records on the DJ set.

Joe, the US section President and his partner Missy were the leading force of a small team who made the experience the best it could be. Their hospitality was second to none, and no ask was too big. They made the whole experience amazing.

A short walk over the River Fox from the College Campus accommodation was De Pere City Hall, housing both the fire and police stations and the mayor's office. In good old-fashioned American friendliness, when I walked over to say hello, I was given a private tour of the fire station, the police station, and the mayor's office—all of which was a great experience, and I took away so much from it all



IPA Brazil: National Public Security Amendment (PEC)



The Public Security Amendment (PEC) is currently being discussed in the Brazilian National Congress. It aims to restructure the Brazilian public security system, seeking greater integration and coordination between the different levels of government and security agencies, through a proposal that constitutionalizes the country's Unified Public Security System (SUSP). The Public Security Amendment (PEC) is seen as an important step toward modernizing and integrating the Brazilian security system, seeking greater efficiency and coordination between the various agencies and levels of government.

The Brazilian Section of the IPA is participating in the debates regarding the Proposed Constitutional Amendment (PEC), which supports the constitutionalization of the country's Unified Public Security System (SUSP), given the expansion of powers within the national police force, and the National Public Security Fund (FNSP) and the National Penitentiary Fund (FUNPEN), guaranteeing resources for the affected areas and preventing the contingency of these funds.

Also regarding the constitutionalisation of the National Public Security Fund (FNSP) and the National Penitentiary Fund (FUNPEN), guaranteeing resources for these areas and preventing the contingency of these funds, in addition to guaranteeing autonomy for police oversight offices and establishing ombudsman offices with autonomy to receive complaints and suggestions from citizens.



On the nineteenth of August of this year (2025), the International Police Association Brazil Section (IPA Brazil) was officially convened by the Public Security Committee of the National Congress to speak on the matter at a Public Hearing in Plenary 6 of the Chamber of Deputies. The chamber was packed with of various police members agencies. approximately two hours of explanations and debates, the IPA's positions in Brazil were unanimously applauded. The IPA's Statement in Brazil was delivered by its national president, for which numerous requests for hearings were received by the federal deputies present, as well as by members of the Public Security Committee of the Brazilian Congress.


